n the early twentieth century, Europe was in the midst of political unrest and on the brink of revolution and world war, yet there was fertile ground for artists to make cross-cultural connections. Both Igor Stravinsky's *Firebird Suite* and Sergei Prokofiev's Violin Concerto No. 1 were Russian compositions that premiered in Paris. In turn, French musicians such as composer Maurice Ravel were being inspired and influenced by Russian music and culture.

This concert, entitled "Connections," includes two pieces by Ravel, "Pavane pour une infante défunte" and "Boléro" as well as the *Firebird Suite*. Violinist Hrabba Atladottir is featured in the Prokofiev concerto.

Ravel wrote the immensely popular "Pavane pour une infante défunte" ("Pavane for a Dead Princess") in 1899 for solo piano and orchestrated it in 1910. He dedicated it to his patron, Princesse Edmond de Polignac, whose father was Isaac Singer, the famous sewing machine manufacturer. The work displays a great but subtle charm and a lightness of touch that became one of Ravel's compositional hallmarks. The world came to know Ravel through his "Boléro" for orchestra. When it debuted, it was met with both enthusiasm and dissent. It is now a well-established work and also embedded in the public consciousness by its prominent use in the popular film 10. "Boléro" is based on a single theme, and its power is felt through its dynamic and masterful orchestration and cumulative crescendo effect.

Steeped in the colors of Russian fairy tales, Stravinsky's early composition *Firebird Suite* is a work of extraordinary brilliance with rich harmonies and an exhilarating rhythmic drive. It is considered Stravinsky's breakout piece and was the first of several ballet scores he wrote, including his masterwork, *The Rite of Spring*.

Prokofiev described his Violin Concerto No. 1 as a "softening of temper" compared to his earlier works, even though it was completed in 1917 amid the turmoil of the October Revolution. This piece is lyrical and meditative in nature yet features violin virtuosity, a combination sure to inspire!

Enjoy this colorful program in which the spirit of the times can be heard, from the exotic story of the Firebird to the magic of Prokofiev and Ravel. Concert dates are **Friday**, **May 16**, **8 p.m. in the Fireside Room**, **Rossmoor Gateway Clubhouse** (tickets available at the door) and **Sunday**, **May 18**, **2 p.m. at the Lesher Center** (tickets available online at www.lesherartscenter.org).

rabba Atladottir, who is featured in our May concerts, was gracious enough to agree to fill in for violinist Juliana Athayde, who recently gave birth to a baby girl. Congratulations to Juliana and her husband, oboist Erik Behr!

Icelandic violinist Hrabba Atladottir studied in Berlin, Germany, with Professor Axel Gerhardt and worked for five years as a freelance violinist in Berlin, regularly playing in the Deutsche Oper, the Deutsches Symphonie-Orchester, and the Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra. She traveled on a world tour with Icelandic pop artist Björk and with violinist Nigel Kennedy on a tour of Germany. Moving to New York in 2004, Atladottir played with orchestras including the Metropolitan Opera, the Orchestra of St. Luke's, the New Jersey Symphony Orchestra, and the New York City Opera. While in New York, she played with the Either/Or ensemble in close collaboration with German composer Helmut Lachenmann. She has performed as a soloist in the Bay Area since 2008, playing with various ensembles such as the Berkeley Contemporary Chamber Players, Left Coast Chamber Ensemble, San Francisco Contemporary Music Players, and Empyrean Ensemble. She also teaches violin at UC Berkeley. 🖨
