Rossmoor's Golden Anniversary!

e'll open our celebration concert for Rossmoor's 50th Anniversary with "Celebrate Today!," an original composition by American contemporary composer and past conductor of the Diablo Symphony Joyce Johnson Hamilton. This work was first written in honor of the Diablo Symphony Orchestra's 50th anniversary season and debuted in 2013. We will share it again on this very significant occasion for Rossmoor!

Our soloist, the critically acclaimed pianist Gwendolyn Mok, will be performing Spanish composer Manuel de Falla's Nights in the Gardens of Spain. This work was influenced by the music of de Falla's homeland (he collected and arranged Spanish folk songs) as well as by that of French Impressionist composers Debussy and Ravel. In 1907 de Falla moved to Paris, and he considered his best periods as an artist to be the ones that he spent in the City of Lights. In fact, this is where the idea for Nights in

the Gardens of Spain was first conceived.

This three-movement nocturne has been described as "vividly atmospheric" as well as "rich, dark, and mysterious." In the composer's own words, "If these 'symphonic impressions' have achieved their object, the mere enumeration of their titles should be a sufficient guide to

the hearer. Although in this work—as

in all that have a legitimate claim to be considered as music-the composer has allowed a definite design...the end for which it was written is no other than to evoke places, sensations, and sentiments. The music has no pretensions to being descriptive; it is merely expressive. But something more than the sound of festivals and dances has inspired these 'evocations in sound, for melancholy and mystery have their part also." Shortly after World War I broke out and Germany declared war in 1914, de Falla moved back

to Madrid, where he completed this inspired work in 1915. Also included in this evening's performance is another of de Falla's compositions, **"Dance No. 1"** from *La Vida Breve*.

You will also experience the rich and varied works of three other celebrated composers from around the world, completing this evening

Gracing Our Concerts on September 18 and October 5 **Our Soloist, Pianist Gwendolyn Mok**

urrently the coordinator of Keyboard Studies at San Jose State University School of Music and Dance, Dr. Gwendolyn Mok began her career in piano at the Juilliard School of Music. She later attended Yale University, where she completed her undergraduate studies, and then State University of New York at Stony Brook, where she earned a doctorate. Mok went on to win several piano competitions.

A native New Yorker, Mok has appeared in many of the world's leading concert halls, including the Barbican, Carnegie Hall, the Kennedy Center, and the Lincoln Center of the Performing Arts. She is frequently invited to play and record with major international orchestras, most notably the London Symphony, the Hong Kong Philharmonic, and the Residentie Orkest of The Hague.

Mok is considered one of the leading experts in the piano music of French composer Maurice Ravel. In 1994 the French Ministry of Culture awarded her a grant to study with French pianist Vlado Perlemuter for one year. He was a student of

Ravel's and, in his 90th year, Perlemuter chose Mok to be the last student on whom he would bestow his knowledge of Ravel. In 1927 Perlemuter sat at the keyboard of Ravel's Erard grand piano and worked his way through Ravel's entire oeuvre alongside the composer. Since 1995 Mok has been performing Ravel's works in recital and was invited to teach these works at the Royal College of Music, the Royal Welsh College of Music and Drama, the Dartington International Summer School in Devon, and the San Francisco Conservatory of Music. Her highly acclaimed debut CD (2001) with the Philharmonia Orchestra of



Ravel's Piano Concerto in G Major (released on the Cala label) was nominated for an Alternative Edison award in the concerto category. For another CD, Ravel Revealed (released in 2002, the same year Perlemuter passed away), Mok was recorded playing the complete solo piano works of Ravel on an 1875 Erard piano. This CD received critical acclaim and is regularly broadcast in the United States, and in England on the BBC.

Mok is also a recording artist for Nonesuch/Elektra. Musical Heritage Society, Cala Records, and EMI. She has performed and recorded with the Orchestra of St. Luke's, the Group for Contemporary Music, and the Empyrean Ensemble and can be heard on several movie soundtrack recordings of music by French composer Maurice Jarre. Her CD (released in 2001) of Saint Saën's "Africa-Rhapsody for Piano and Orchestra" with the London Philharmonic garnered much attention and is broadcast frequently.

Mok was also the director of INFORMANCE!, a music program that benefited 400 children in East London's public schools.
